I breed designer ball pythons. The reason why I can get away with buying a male that is a potential breeder for 10k is I know when he is an adult, there is a high likelihood that it will breed and I will get somewhat a return on my investment.

In this world, depending on your standard, your dog may not be around 3 years. I felt like the majority of people feel like it's not a good return on oddswise to pay a premium amount, unless they're already coming from high percentage parents/lineage. Even then, it's still not guaranteed. With other breeds, they barely care about confirmation nowadays. Put 2 dogs together, have a decent marketing plan, sell puppies, wash, rinse, repeat.

#### **Leo Crie**

- 1. Supply and demand controls are markets & pricing with that the more popular the bigger the asking price or prices go upward.
- 2. There are American Pitbull Terrier (sporting dogs) and there are American "pet bulls with that said newbie, I informed or those that lack the knowledge of what a sporting dog (combat) will seek different prices deals hoping to own a game dog. On the other hand, some folks just want a look and not so much performance (popularity)
- 3. The supply of so called "pit bulls" have mixed prices due to over breeding, mix breeding and people who don't deserve to own pure game dogs.
- 4. The equilibrium price for a decent to excellent American Pitbull Terrier puppy should be based on a price that equates to allowing those highly interested in the breed, can care for the breed, people that acquired knowledge about the breed and are willing to surrender the puppy/dog back to the breeder (no refund) if they can't take care of the breed. Hence, quality screening before allowing a purchase can keep the price index up as opposed to a few hundred dollars (low prices).

### Richard Garcia.

The difference with our breed or any working/sporting breeds is there is an expectation of performance compared to other breeds that are strictly pets.

People will pay an exorbitant amount for a pet but they expect a return on their investment on a working/sporting breed. In my opinion if you're involved with working/sporting breeds you should know there are no guarantees but it always amazes me that people will put more time, cash and affection in their pet than they would a pit bull. If it truly is the greatest breed in the world then it should be treated that way.

A well-bred dog from an honest breeder/working camp is PRICELESS in my opinion and I'm not too cheap to invest big dollars into my passion when I feel it's a worthy investment.
