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Pitbull mauls domestic worker

A DOMESTIC worker lost her right arm after being mauled by her employer's pitbull terrier while trying to save the family's tortoise.

The incident occurred at a Cambridge home on Wednesday.

Nenecha Thelma Mantsihane, a domestic worker of 14 years at the household, spoke to the Dispatch yesterday from her hospital bed.

"The dog was tied up as there were people in the yard fixing a wall. When they were done, they

hid farewell and left the yard. I then untied the dog and let it loose in the yard," Mantsihane said.

Then she resumed her normal household chores.

"I heard the tortoise make a sound outside and when I went to investigate, I saw the dog biting it. I got hold of a bucket, filled it with water and poured it on the dog to save the tortoise.

The dog left the tortoise and charged at me. It bit me and wres-

ted me to the ground," Mantsihane said.

The pitbull savaged her left arm, right arm and face and finally locked its teeth on her neck.

"I knew I was not going to survive and I fell unconscious," said Mantsihane.

Police spokesman Captain Nookkie Moku said as the woman was lying bleeding in the yard, a police van with two police officers happened to be driving past.

"Police rushed injury, entered and rescued the woman. She has very serious injuries and was rushed to hospital."

"No case was opened."

Mantsihane went into the operating theatre yesterday afternoon for doctors to save her left hand.

Her employer, who declined to be named, said: "It is an unfortunate event. We have made arrangements to have the dog put down."

Taxi protests to block EL roads

EASTERN Cape taxi operators embark today on a province-wide protest where they will march to government offices in Bisho to hand over a petition.

Operators are demanding taxi operating licences from the department of transport. They complain that without it, their vehicles are constantly impounded by law-enforcement officers.

The march was supposed to take place earlier in the week but was postponed to today.

Santaco provincial chairman Nolutsheng Mahabane said despite difficulties from government, the march will go ahead.

"We contribute greatly to the economy and we want to receive benefits," said Mahabane.

The planned total shut down will affect thousands of commuters as some taxi operators say they will block roads to monitor those operators who are not supporting their cause.

Private vehicles, buses and trains are also expected to be affected.

East London police spokeswoman Warrant Officer Hazel Mqila said the police will be on high alert.

Transport department spokesman Nenecha Mahabane said they were in the process of putting a moratorium through planning authorities on issuing of operating licences to all non-contracting services so as to verify the supply and demand.

"This was influenced by a number of violent incidents where associations were fighting over routes. It became glaringly obvious that the routes are saturated and this is the main reason behind delays in issuing operating licences," said Mahabane.

He added that the department had decided to engage with local planning authorities to verify routes before it could adjudicate over new applications.

"The department has since communicated with the industry that as from June 20 the provincial regulatory entity will start its adjudication process in verifying routes as per its schedule."

Santaco accused transport MEC Wernie Tlana of not favouring them in the industry and of taking them out of business. Mahabane said this was untrue.

"The MEC continues to hold all departmental stakeholders in high esteem including the public transport industry roleplayers," said Mahabane.

The march is expected to start at 10am from the Victoria Grounds in King William's Town and proceed to Bisho. — bongani@dailydispatch.co.za

Massive sanitary pads drive to help schoolgirls

SERIAL do-gooder Thelma Machasa and Mthobelo Wemane FM radio religious show presenter Reverend Mzukisi Paleni are embarking on a campaign to collect a million sanitary pads by the end of June.

The two radio personalities and priests are now appealing to other men to assist with the campaign.

Machasa, who is the archbishop of the Bandula Lasekimi Evangelical Movement and a radio personality,

said he was approached by school teachers in Lusikisiki with an assortment of needs.

"I have noted with deep concern that most young ladies, especially in the rural schools of the Eastern Cape, are suffering. One young lady related her story, which was and is still heart-breaking."

"Amongst other things that she mentioned was that at times as a Grade 12 student she could not go to school, in particular during her menstruation period, because she does not have any means to afford sanitary towels commonly known by men as pads. If you are a father you will understand how I felt when she said this to me."

Machasa said they are appealing to all men to get involved in the "One Month, One Million Sanitary Towels" campaign. The pads will then be handed over to the office of O.R. Tambo municipality mayor Nombusoza Mthembu to distribute to needy schools.

"We would love it that men understand that we need to break the strings of culture and religion which

compromise our responsibility. If you are a woman but you share the same feelings with us, you can contribute," said Machasa.

Paleni, who is the presenter of Umhlobo Wemane's Nkomo Nengqingo religious show, said that they had already travelled to many areas in this campaign.

"Surprisingly, men have embraced the idea and are doing their best to ensure that the target was reached."

Paleni is also taking the campaign to male officials of Polisomo Prison

in Cape Town and other prisons.

Traditional leaders in the Eastern Cape welcomed the initiative, saying they were happy that men were taking a lead in programmes that sought to improve the lives of girls.

"It means that men are publicly breaking the stereotypes," said Con-trela deputy secretary Chief Nondiso Mthembu.

Municipality extends public works contracts

THE Alfred Nzo district municipality has extended the contracts of 422 Extended Public Works Programme (EPWP) employees for six months.

The decision was taken at a meeting attended by economic development MEC Sakhamzi Somo, his cooperative governance and traditional affairs and transport counterparts Fikile Kasa and Wesiwe Tlana, and municipal bosses on Wednesday night in Ennako-

sibent (Mount Ayliff). The meeting was also attended by the ANC provincial executive committee's depolitee to the region, Nombusoza Mthembu, and the ruling party's regional executive committee.

The contract extensions come after the SA Municipal Workers' Union (SAMWU) and Ennako-sibent residents brought the small town to a standstill for days. Extension of the EPWP workers' contracts was among their demands. This effectively brought the week-long strike to an end yesterday.

Alfred Nzo district municipal

manager Zamilile Sakhundla yesterday said they had received R5-million from public works to fund their EPWP project. The money was supposed to benefit 250 beneficiaries over a year.

"But because we saw the situation was getting out of hand and that we are now going to the local government elections, we decided to compromise so that all 422 EPWP workers will benefit, but only for six months," he said.

The accounting officer said 25% of the R5 million would go towards the workers' protective clothing.

Samwu regional chairman Pam-bili Tsetse said they would continue negotiating for the EPWP workers to be absorbed by the municipality.

DA councillor Bandle Mbewu questioned why the same people were benefiting from the EPWP project.

"Our position is that the whole district must benefit. Why are the same people benefiting? We want every poor person to benefit. It is supposed to rotate and not have the same group benefiting," he said. — ndamase@dailydispatch.co.za

WE OFTEN hear about South Africa's dismal education outcomes and low literacy rates, yet we hear much less about the actions that ordinary South Africans are taking to turn that around.

Artists Neo Mathaba and Cawell Mangaliso Mthabane, from Mthabane, were organising drama performances with children in their Mthabane neighbourhood when they realised the kids had a big problem: they were struggling to read. So they went door-to-door in their township community, asking for

book donations and collected close to 2000 books which they stored in a small building behind Mthabane's house.

John Nicholson, a pastor who lives in Lavender Hill, also built a library in his

back yard to help improve literacy.

But helping children learn to love to read isn't rocket science - and being a literacy activist doesn't have to mean opening a library in your backyard.

There is a growing awareness that preventing a culture of reading would be a game-changer to tackle the poor learning outcomes, poverty and inequality.

And there are small, simple things that each one of us can do to help children reach their potential.

Being a literacy activist can simply mean visiting a school on World Read Aloud Day to bring a story

to life for children; donating snacks to a local reading club or reading programme; talking to other parents about the benefits of reading aloud; asking friends and family to donate books in lieu of birthday gifts or gathering grandchildren around to tell stories after dinner.

I didn't see it then, but my mom was a literacy activist. She took me to get my first library card at the age of three, when I could hardly sign my name.

Even once I'd learned to read, we still gathered every night in my sister's bed to listen to stories. My neighbour, Michelle,

THE mass killing of cattle by the Xhosa people more than a century and a half ago was at the centre of deliberations at an Eastern Cape university yesterday.

Scholars tested the authenticity of the saga at the two-day conference titled Nongqawuse's Prophecies and the Xhosa Cattle Killing Movement, hosted by the University of Port Harcourt at the main campus in Alice in partnership with the Amathole District Municipality (ADM).

The conference, also attended by pupils from local schools, comes amid ongoing discussions on land ownership in the country.

Renowned scholar Professor Jeff Peires, who has written extensively on the Nongqawuse prophecy, said the cattle killing had indeed hap-

opened in the mid-1850s and was not a fairytale. "This was a trick by Sir George Grey," he said.

Grey was the British governor of the Cape Colony at the time.

Peires said among questions scholars should investigate were how Grey influenced a young girl to tell Xhosa to kill their cattle.

Nongqawuse was only 17 at the time.

"About 80% of Xhosa lost their cattle and only 20% refused to slaughter their cattle," Peires said before the cattle

killing, white farmers had only occupied land around areas of Grahamstown. After the cattle saga, they settled in farms around Stutterheim and Cullinan.

The spread, he said, was evident in the number of graves of white farmers in these towns.

Peires said the Nongqawuse saga followed the British army defeat in one of the wars being fought in the

Nkonkobe area and another war, which resulted in a stalemate.

He said there were other incidents before Xhosa slaughtered their cattle, which included the British bringing a shipload of cattle infected with disease.

He said the intention was to spread the disease to kill cattle owned by Xhosa.

UFH registrar Professor Michael

Somiso said the intention of the British was to enslave the Xhosa and subjugate them to British rule.

"This was not an innocent act. Xhosa are still struggling today," he said.

Somiso said he understood the Economic Freedom Fighters, Pan Africanist Congress and Zimbabwean president Robert Mugabe's stance on land ownership.

"It's worrying today that our people don't have land in their own country. Their houses are demolished and some are moved."

Other scholars said Nongqawuse was not the culprit.

They said it was Mhlakaza, the first black Anglican man, who was an agent provocateur sent by the British to spread the lie to Xhosa to kill their cattle and burn their crops.

ADM's Babileli Madikane said the discussions would assist to rewrite the history of Nongqawuse and reconcile the Xhosa nation.

Among the pupils present was Dumisani Fumeleni from Lindani Senior Secondary school.

Fumeleni said he was interested in the topic but hoped for encouragement to further his studies.

"I have come here with the hope that some of the speakers will offer words of motivation and encouragement. Words that I may be able to consume and use in my daily life."

Anelisa Tyantisa from Eyalutini Secondary School said she needed clarity on the Nongqawuse saga.

"It is a story that I have been inquisitive about for years now, so I'm seeking verification," she said.

Other high schools that attended the conference were Iyanga and Thababatho High School.

Resolutions of the conference are expected to be made today. — *Additional reporting by Yolande Quhe*

Search for US student moves up a gear with more eyes in the sky

THE parents of 19-year-old American student Nicolas Upton are in South Africa and have hired an East London-based aviation company to help find any sign of their missing son.

He is feared drowned after being swept away by a strong rip current on a Wild Coast beach five days ago.

Co-owner of Westline Aviation Les Daley confirmed his company was flying helicopters and a light fixed-wing aircraft to scour cliffs and gulches along the shoreline.

Private aircraft owner Craig Rance, of Stutterheim-based Rance Timbers, also joined the search after Daley asked those flying along the beach to be on the lookout.

Upton, a first-year student at George Washington University, is feared drowned after disappearing while swimming with a group of five friends on Sunday evening.

His parents were expected to arrive at the Bulungulu Lodge, situated at Engeleni Village, Elliotdale, today.

The American student and his friends were guests at the lodge.

The SAPS K9 search and rescue unit using boats and sniffer dogs have conducted daily searches for the

missing student without success.

Yesterday, the thundering sound of engines dominated the skyline along the Wild Coast yesterday as the search moved up a gear.

Daley said they began the search on Wednesday, a day after his company was approached by the US Embassy to conduct daily searches along

the coastline on behalf of Upton's family.

However, rough seas, a strong south-westerly wind and big swells were hampering the search efforts.

Daley hoped that conditions would become more conducive after the SA Weather Service had positive predictions going into the weekend.

Spanish tourist couple Omar Lora and Jara Febrer had arrived at the same time as the American group and last saw them an hour before the incident.

The 28-year-old Spanish filmmaker Lora said he only noticed something was amiss the following day.

"I woke up in the morning and the

place was very quiet, silent and there were these young students crying and community members were around. One guy told me that one of them had disappeared. It's quite tragic," Lora said.

Bulungulu Lodge manager Lindile Mthiyi said he was less concerned about the negative impact on the

business because somebody's life was involved.

"It was dark when they went to swim. We have rules and notice boards that warn bathers against swimming in some parts of the beach," Mthiyi said.

Village elder Vuthango Shoni, 67, said the whole community was

shocked by the incident.

We pray that that he is found, even if it's his body, so his parents can get closure," Shoni said.

He pointed to seven graves of locals and tourists who had drowned there in the past, including that of a Belgian tourist who vanished eight years ago. — *Instagram@dispatch.co.za*

A CHILD aged 9 has been savaged in another vicious pitbull attack, this time in Mthatha.

A walk to buy cheese at an NU2 store turned into a nightmare for little Zukhanye Ramcwana when the dog attacked her, ripping into her leg muscles.

She had been with her older sister Pelisa when attacked.

"We were walking to the local shop when we spotted the pitbull fighting with another dog," Zukhanye said.

"Before I knew it, it was charging at us and I immediately told my older sister to run because she was unaware."

They tried to get into a nearby house but because Zukhanye was behind, the dog caught her.

"It was not long before it gripped onto my leg and I just couldn't shake it off me. I was screaming hysterically and my sister was already out of sight," said Zukhanye.

The emotional child said she was rescued by a neighbour who knew the dog and was able to call it off.

An elderly couple who did not



know travelling past in a bakkie stopped and hurried them to the clinic, and even waited for them.

Pelisa said the clinic referred them to Cecilia Makwane Hospital where

Zukhanye's wounds were dressed and stitched.

Andiswa Msila, 32, who was attacked by the same pitbull in December last year, said the dog needed to be put down or taken away.

She was attacked early on a Sunday morning while in a local tavern, and was hospitalised for a month.

"I still get flashbacks of that day," Elizabeth Dilephantisi, 77, who kept the dog on her unsecured premises, said it did not belong to her, and was not her responsibility.

"My grandson's friend who moved to Mossel Bay had requested we keep

his dog here while he was away, but because it is making me a terrible person in my neighbourhood, I took it back."

Dilephantisi was adamant that the pitbull, named Bruce Willis, was harmless.

Ntuzelo Skyle, the brother of the dog's owner, said although the dog belonged to his brother, he would ensure it did not attack again while he looked for another place to keep it.

He said he had not heard of the recent attack. — *mbali@dispatch.co.za*

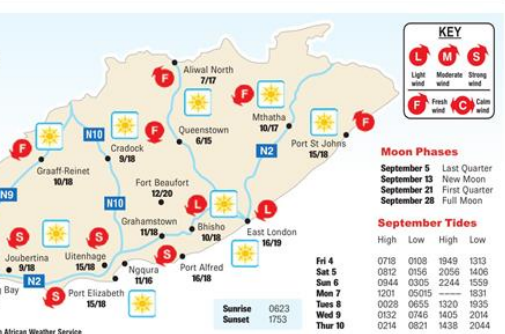
